DIVIDEND

Your Directors are pleased to recommend for your consideration a Dividend of Rs.2.50 per equity share for the year ended 31.3.1999, absorbing Rs.205.35 Lacs, including tax on dividend payable by the company.

PERFORMANCE OF THE YEAR UNDER REVIEW

CEMENT DIVISION:

During the year under review, the Cement Division has produced 218919 MT of cement

as against 209590 MT of cement for the previous year and could achieve the capacity utilisation of 110.60%. The Profit for the division was Rs.143.78 lacs.

SUGAR DIVISION:

During the year under review, the Sugar Division crushed 2,68,793 MT of sugar cane and for the full season it was 3,25,075 MT as against 88,631 MT for the previous season and achieved 100% capacity utilisation for the first time. The recovery rate was 10.20% compared to 9.7% for the previous season.



Sales for the year was Rs.1799.41 lacs as against Rs.683.53 lacs for the previous year. The Profit for the division was Rs.135.23 lacs.

CURRENT YEAR OUTLOOK: CEMENT DIVISION:

In the first four months of the current year i.e. April-July, 1999, the production of cement was 88,538 MT, as against 86,492 MT of the first four months of the previous year. The demand for cement in the first four months has increased by about 22% in the Southern region. Realisation of prices of cement have started improving. Your Directors hope to achieve better performance during the remaining part of the current year, in view of the recovery in cement prices and improved offtake of cement.

The Government of India has increased the capacity and despatch limits for mini cement Companies from 1,98,000 MT (600 TPD) and 2,20,000 MT to 2,97,000 MT (900 TPD) and 3,00,000 MT respectively. In view of the said revision, your Company has plans to increase the installed capacity to the required level; and avail of the prevailing boom in the cement market condition.

SUGAR DIVISION:

As a result of the concerted efforts for development of sugar cane, it is hoped that the division will achieve better capacity utilisation during the current year.

It is hoped that when the proposed levy obligations on the imported sugar also are enforced, after the new Government assumes power at the Centre, prices of domestic sugar will improve. Thus, your Company foresees better prospects for the Sugar Division in the coming months of the financial year.

Y2K COMPLIANCE:

The Company does not foresee any major problem on account of Year 2000 (Y2K) and is confident of making all the systems

Y2K compliant at the earliest, whereve required.

FIXED DEPOSITS:

The aggregate amount of deposits accepted by the Company as on 31.03.1999 stood at Rs.13.86 lakhs. There were no fixed deposits which were matured but not claimed as on that date.

DIRECTORS:

In accordance with the provisions of the Companies Act, 1956 and the Company's Articles of Association, Sri J Seshagiri Rao and Sri V B R Suryam retire by rotation and are eligible for reappointment.

INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS:

The industrial relations continued to be cordial during the year under review. The Board wishes to place on record its appreciation to all employees for their efforts and cooperation to the high level of performance and growth of business during the year.

INSURANCE:

All the properties of the Company including its buildings, Plant and Machinery and Stocks wherever required have been adequately insured.

STATEMENT PURSUANT TO SECTION 217 (2A) OF THE COMPANIES ACT, 1956 AND COMPANIES (PARTICULARS OF EMPLOY-EES) RULES, 1975 (FORMING PART OF THE DIRECTORS' REPORT)

As none of the employees has drawn more remuneration than the limits prescribed under the above Rules, no statement is enclosed.

ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION: CEMENT DIVISION:

The Company is the first mini cament plant to install ESP & CT for abatement of pollution in Unit I and Unit II. Pollution



control is given top priority in the factory. The Company installed ESP, Dust collectors, Multi Cyclones, water sprayers at all vulnerable places. More and more efforts are being made in afforestation and in developing green belt area in the factory, mines and colony. All the pollution control equipment are working with full efficiency and the performance is monitored with our own equipment both in plant and mines area.

SUGAR DIVISION:

By spending huge amounts the Company has fully automated the Boilers resulting in better and efficient combustion and this helped in preventing unburnt fuel going to the chimney. For removal of ash from the Dust Collectors on continuous basis, dust collectors are provided with Bin at the end of belt conveyor. A blower is provided with a ducting up to Bin connecting the outlets of two dust collectors of the systems.

Effluent Treatment Plant:- Action is already iritiated for upgradation of ETP and the works are expected to be completed before November, 1999, besides recycling of cooling water and lifting out hot water into safe place.

Planting of saplings and seedlings in and around the Factory and Colony is being continued to develop greenery to protect environment.

AUDITORS:

M/S. M.ANANDAM & CO., Chartered Accountants, Secunderabad, the Auditors of the Company retire at the conclusion of this Annual General Meeting and they are eligible for re-appointment.

COST AUDIT

The Central Government had ordered audit of cost accounts relating to manufacture of cement. For the year ended 31st March 1999, with the approval of Central Government, M/s. Narasimha Murthy & Co., Cost Accountants, Hyderabad have been appointed to conduct the Cost Audit.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS:

Your Directors wish to express their thanks for the assistance received from IDBI, ICICI, IFCI and APIDC from time to time.

Your Directors also thank the State Bank of India, Industrial Finance Branch, Somajiguda, Hyderabad and Indian Bank, Himayatnagar Branch, Hyderabad for extending the support towards working capital to meet the requirements of its operations.

Your Directors appreciate the support and the cooperation received from the State Government and the Central Government for the Company's growth and development.

A. CONSERVATION OF ENERGY

- Energy Conservation Measures adopted:
 - 1. Optimum utilisation of equipment.
 - Replacing the motors where the motors are underloaded.
 - 3. Upgradation of PLC at a cost of Rs. 15.00 lakhs was commissioned and this helps optimum utilisation of energy.
 - Optimum utilisation of captive power generation sets, thus reducing fuel consumption.
 - 5. Balancing of machinery is being carried by engaging qualified personnel on annual contract bass to reduce power consumption.
- Additional Investments and Proposal for Reduction of Consumption of Energy:

 - AC variable speed drivers are being procured as a part of energy conservation.
 Proposals are approved for converting Analog based coal weigh feeder to Micro Processor based system at a cost of Rs.4.50 lakhs. This will help in saving in coal and increasing efficiency.
 - 3. For reducing cost of fuel, the power generation sets are being converted from HSD oil based to Furnace oil based at a cost of Rs.300 lakhs.
 - The contracted maximum Demand of APSEB supply of 4980 KVA is reduced to 3480 KVA with effect from April, 1999 saving annually Rs.30.00 lakhs on Power.
- Impact of the above measures: The benefit and significance of the measures is evident from lower consumption of energy.
