Your Directors have pleasure in presenting the 31st Annual report of your Company together with the Audited Annual Accounts for the year ended 31st March, 2010.

DIVIDEND:

In view of the inadequate profit during the year under review and in order to conserve resources for future, your Directors do not recommend any Dividend for the year ended 31.03.2010.

OPERATIONS:

During the financial year under review, the Company has secured some infrastructure development contracts which have been part implemented. The slowdown in industry did not give impetus to the Company's growth and the sales have not shown major increase while due to increased expenses, the profitability came down to Rs. 61.92 lacs.

FORFEITURE OF SHARES

The equity shares which were forfeited have been re-issued by the Company at Rs 23 per share and have been listed at the Stock exchange during the period under review. However as per the directives of Bombay Stock Exchange the Company was supposed to issue the shares at Rs 57.75 per share and therefore the balance amount of Rs 34.75 had been collected by the Company after the Financial year end, i.e upto May, 2010.

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FUTURE OUTLOOK:

Due to non-availability of adequate financial resources and the recessionary pressure hitting the Indian economy and that too with a vengeance towards the real estate industry, the Company's efforts to make headway in infrastructural development projects could not take off as perceived. However, during the period, fresh funds have been sourced by re-issue of the forfeited shares and the impact of availability of long term financial resources will be reflected in the current year working with the Company planning to explore several new project contracts for development and construction. The Company foresees an improvement in market conditions soon and with that the revenues are likely to improve while it would be possible to re-plough the profitability. The Company is also ready with some real estate ventures for sale.

DIRECTORS:

Shri M. Vishuvardhan Rao and Shri R. Chakravarthy retire by rotation at the ensuing Annual General meeting and being eligible, offers themselves for reappointment. During the period under review

AUDITORS :

The Auditors M/s P.Murali & Co., Chartered Accountants, Hyderabad hold office upto conclusion of the ensuing Annual General Meeting. The Board recommends their reappointment for the year 2010-2011.

ANNEXURE- B**MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS****Industry Structure and Development**

After recording a spectacular growth of over 12%, more than the country's GDP in the past half decade, the Indian construction sector all of a sudden lost steam in last fiscal largely due to global financial turmoil. Not just this, the turmoil tremors created multiplier impact across sectors including steel, cement, power, petroleum, aluminium, IT and ports, besides badly bruising the Indian economy. The industry in India is highly fragmented and has about 300,000 construction companies operating nationwide. Taking clue from the Government's ambitious projects lined up for the Eleventh Plan period, the demand for construction is expected to grow by at least 8-9%.

Despite slowdown in industrial and manufacturing sector, the demand for power remains robust, but the growth in the sector is dotted with innumerable challenges that result from the gap that exist between what has been planned versus what the power sector is able to derive. The various proposals in generation and transmission are currently under different implementation stages. Despite the fact that the power sector in India has been plagued with a set of problems for meeting the planned targets, the outlook remains very optimistic for the coming years.

With a population of one billion and an underdeveloped telecommunications infrastructure, India's unfulfilled demand for telecommunications products and services is huge. India is currently the world's second most attractive telecommunications products and services market wherein the demand for Telecom Towers shall remain robust creating huge opportunities for the Company.

Opportunities and Threats

The Company has now entered into the business of generation and distribution of power and telecommunication service activity, apart from the existing construction activity, both of which are providing a tremendous potential for growth. The distribution of power with minimum losses and accountability for the same offers growth for power related equipments and instruments like electronic meters, online monitoring and billing etc wherein the Company is taking steps for its presence in the sector. Government emphasis on creating infrastructure in villages through Rural Infrastructure Development Fund (RIDF) has raised hopes for Company that the growing demands from the rural heartland will help the Company to grab the opportunity and take up new projects.

The presence in power and telecom sectors requires substantial financial resources to be pumped into the Company for growth of business which effort has been started during the last quarter of the financial year ended 31st March, 2010 and the first quarter of the current fiscal, however the same may not be enough for substantial growth, the presence of large number of power intermediaries and bureaucratic bottlenecks the acceptance of technology being developed by the Company may be a challenge.

Outlook

In the current scenario, as it is noticed that the Indian economy is in recovery phase from global recession and the Company, having entered into telecom and power sector

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, has great hope for exploring new activity and expectations for growth in the forthcoming period. Your Company has drawn all the plans for setting up manufacturing units for Power utility meters and is in the process of installation of the required machinery to commence the manufacturing activity in future. The Company proposes to seek effective and functional alliances with other organizations with aims and activities similar to that of the Company in the international arena and domestically as well.

Due to non-availability of adequate financial resources and the recessionary pressure hitting the Indian economy and that too with a vengeance towards the real estate industry, the Company's efforts to make headway in infrastructural development projects could not take off as perceived. However, during the period, fresh funds have been sourced by re-issue of the forfeited shares and the impact of availability of long term financial resources will be reflected in the current year working with the Company planning to explore several new project contracts for development and construction. The Company foresees an improvement in market conditions soon and with that the revenues are likely to improve while it would be possible to re-plough the profitability. The Company is also ready with some real estate ventures for sale.

Risk and Concern

The major risk is presence of large number of power intermediaries and bureaucratic bottlenecks the acceptance of technology being developed by the Company may be a challenge. Besides, as the sector is very fragmented, availability of adequate financial resources to sustain the growth may hamper the establishment of new line of activity.

The major concern is equipment shortage, scarcity of fuels such as coal, gas and other fuels. The raising input cost for telecom and power towers particularly steel and cement prove to be deterrent to the profitability. The ongoing power generation projects installation are likely to come on stream from 2011 onwards which will pave the way for growth of the Company thereafter.

Internal Control system

The Company has put in place the adequate system of internal controls for having proper controls and to improve efficiency in operations.

The internal control systems also of the Company also aims at effective monitoring of utilization of resources is optimum and proper, and the control system also monitors compliance of various applicable laws to the Company.

The system comprises a well-defined organization structure, pre-identified authority levels and documented policy guidelines and manuals for delegation of authority.

A qualified and independent audit committee of the Board of Directors reviews the adequacy of internal controls.

Financial performance

During the year under review total income of the company has increased to Rs. 29.78 crores from Rs. 29.52 crores in previous year. However, due to increase in expenses and provisions, the Profit is reduced to Rs. 61.92 lakhs as against Rs. 100.94 lakhs.
